PALM SUNDAY-APRIL 28, 2024 The Holy Nine Martyrs of Cyzikos

Palm Sunday

Yesterday (the Saturday of Lazarus) and today (Palm Sunday) serve as a transition weekend bridging Great Lent with Holy Week. On Saturday, we remember the resurrection of our Lord's friend Lazarus after being dead in the tomb four days. This feast provides us a foreshadowing of Christ's own resurrection. We hear Jesus tell Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in Me, though he die, yet shall he live" (Jn. 11:25). This is important for us to re-

member as we see Jesus enter Jerusalem and undergo His betrayal, arrest, trial, mocking, scourging, and crucifixion. Our faith needs to become truly great in order for us to believe in Christ's victory beyond these horrifying events.

Today, we celebrate Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. This is arguably one of the most interesting feasts of Christ's life, because it is filled with so many seeming paradoxes. First, we know that Jesus is the King of kings and Lord of lords, but instead of victoriously entering His city riding on a stallion with a powerful army, Jesus enters "humble and mounted on a donkey" (Matt. 21:5). Secondly, we know that Jesus's disciples did not feel very triumphant, but were scared for their Master and for themselves. Thirdly, a crowd of people laid down their garments on the road while others spread palm branches, but it is safe to assume that some of these same people, at the end of the same week, were part of a different crowd crying out, "Crucify Him!" The final paradox is that Jesus did not enter the city of Jerusalem to conquer it or sit upon a throne. He came to prepare His disciples for His death by instituting the Mystical Supper (the Eucharist) and to suffer and die on a Roman Cross.

We know that each of these paradoxes reveal important truths. Jesus's Kingdom is not of this world. Heaven and earth shall pass away, but Christ's Kingdom is eternal. As Christians, our citizenship is not of this world. As the King of kings, Jesus is humble and a servant. His life expresses that the first shall be last, and the last shall be first. Finally, the real enemies of our Lord were never the human beings He created, but the Evil One, sin, and death. Our Lord's power is in His self-sacrificial love and His purity of heart, thought, and life. Nothing in the universe can compare to these all-powerful weapons. His entry into Jerusalem teaches us to fight the same enemies with the same weapons. "Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!"

Discussion Questions:

- 1. It is challenging to live in the world, but not be of the world. Peer pressure—or following the "herd" makes this challenge particularly difficult. How can we in our everyday life stay true to our convictions about our Christian faith and not give in to contrary peer pressure?
- 2. Holy Week is upon us, and we have the opportunity to participate in many beautiful services. Discuss how we can more fully participate this year over previous years.

HYMNS AND READINGS FOR PALM SUNDAY

APOLYTIKION MODE 1: Before your passion you confirmed the resurrection of all by raising Lazarus from the dead, O Christ our God. Therefore, like the children of old, we also carry symbols of victory, and to you, the victor over death, do we cry out: Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

APOLYTIKION MODE 4: In our baptism we were buried with you, O Christ our God, and by your resurrection you have granted us eternal life. Therefore, we sing your praises, O Lord: Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

PALM SUNDAY KONTAKION-MODE PL. 2: Being born upon a throne in Heaven, and upon a colt on the earth, O Christ God, You did accept the praise of the Angels and the laudation of the children as they cried to You: Blessed are You Who comes to recall Adam.

THE EPISTLE READING IS FROM PAUL'S LETTER TO THE PHILIPPIANS 4:4-9: Brethren, rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, do; and the God of peace will be with you.

THE GOSPEL READING IS FROM JOHN 12:1-18: Six days before Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazaros was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. There they made him a supper; Martha served, and Lazaros was one of those at table with him. Mary took a pound of costly ointment of pure nard and anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair; and the house was filled with the fragrance of the ointment. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (he who was to betray him), said, "Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?" This he said, not that he cared for the poor but because he was a thief, and as he had the money box he used to take what was put into it. Jesus said, "Let her alone, let her keep it for the day of my burial. The poor you always have with you, but you do not always have me." When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came, not only on account of Jesus but also to see Lazaros, whom he had raised from the dead. So the chief priests planned to put Lazaros also to death, because on account of him many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus. The next day a great crowd who had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" And Jesus found a young donkey and sat upon it; as it is written, "Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your king is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt!" His disciples did not understand this at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that this had been written of him and had been done to him. The crowd that had been with him when he called Lazaros out of the tomb and raised him from the dead bore witness. The reason why the crowd went to meet him was that they heard he had done this sign.

PRAYER FOR THE BLESSING OF THE PALMS

Deacon: Let us pray to the Lord **Choir:** Lord have mercy


Priest: O Lord our God, who sits upon the cherubim, who has reaffirmed Your might, You sent out Your only-begotten Son our Lord Jesus Christ. Through His Cross and grave and Resurrection He saved the world. As He approached Jerusalem, unto His voluntary passion, the people that sat in darkness and in the shadow of death took the symbols of victory, the boughs of trees in branches of palms, foretelling the Resurrection. Do You Yourself, O Master, preserve and keep us also who on this feast, following their example, bear in our hands palms and boughs of trees. And like those multitudes and children who cried to You "Hosanna," may we also in hymns and spiritual songs participate in the life-giving Resurrection on the third day, through the same Christ Jesus our Lord, with whom You are blessed, together with Your all-holy and good and life-giving Spirit, now and ever, and unto ages of ages.

The Bridegroom Services of Holy Week

Beginning on the evening of Palm Sunday and continuing through the evening of Holy Tuesday, the Orthodox Church observes a special service known as the Bridegroom Service. Each evening service is the Matins or Orthros service of the following day, celebrated one half day in advance. The name of the service is from the figure of the Bridegroom in the parable of the Ten Virgins found in Matthew 25:1-13. The first part of Holy Week presents us with an array of themes based chiefly on the last days of Jesus' earthly life. The story of the Passion is preceded by a series of incidents located in Jerusalem and a collection of parables, sayings and discourses centered on Jesus' divine Sonship, the Kingdom of God, the Second Coming, and Jesus' castigation of the hypocrisy and dark motives of the religious leaders. The observances of the first three days of Holy Week are rooted in these incidents and sayings. The three days constitute a single liturgical unit. They have the same cycle and system of daily prayer. The Scripture lessons, hymns, commemorations, and ceremonials that make up the festal elements in the respective services of the cycle highlight significant aspects of salva-

tion history, by calling to mind the events that anticipated the Passion and by proclaiming the inevitability and significance of the Second Coming and Judgment. The title Bridegroom suggests an intimate relationship of love. It is not without significance that the kingdom of God is compared to a bridal feast and a bridal chamber. The Christ of the Passion is the divine Bridegroom of the Church. The imagery connotes the final union of the Lover and His beloved. The title Bridegroom also suggests the Second Coming and Judgment. In the patristic tradition, the aforementioned parable is related to the Second Coming; and is associated with the need for spiritual vigilance and preparedness, by which we are enabled to keep the divine commandments and receive the blessings of the age to come. The troparion "Behold the Bridegroom comes in the middle of the night...", which is sung at the beginning of the Orthros of Great Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, relates the worshiping community to that essential expectation: watching and waiting for the Lord, who will come again to judge the living and the dead.
